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1	TRANSCRIPT OF PROCEEDINGS
2	MS. VINSON: Are we ready? Mr. Rogillio, would
3	you lead us in The Pledge and a moment of silence.
4	(Pledge of Allegiance and brief moment of silence.)
5	MS. VINSON: Okay. Roll call.
6	(Roll call.)
7	MS. VINSON: The next item is the Reading of the
8	Minutes of the previous meeting.
9	MR. ROJAS: I make a motion we dispense with the
10	reading.
11	MR. DUPLECHAIN: Second.
12	MS. VINSON: Motion is made. Any discussion?
13	All in favor.
14	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
15	MS. VINSON: We'll move on to the hearings.
16	MR. ROGILLIO: Ms. Vinson, might I suggest that,
17	since we need to clear the room for these two hearings,
18	maybe you might want to skip that and come back to it at
19	the end. That's up to you guys, but.
20	MS. VINSON: Do we need a motion to amend the
21	agenda or?
22	MR. ROGILLIO: No. We can take the next item.
23	I'm just suggesting that, because we have to clear the
24	room and go into executive session, so.
25	LEGAL UPDATE/LEGISLATION

MS. VINSON: Okay. Legal Update, Mr. Blackburn. MR. BLACKBURN: We have an -- it should be in your packets.

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MS. RYLAND: No, it's not. I'm sorry.

MR. BLACKBURN: It should be getting to you shortly, the piece of legislation. We took the three or four ideas that y'all discussed with us last time and put them in one piece of legislation. And, hopefully, you will have a chance to look at that. Adrienne will tell you what's in them to refresh your memory, but we need for you to review it and then decide whether you want to go with it or not, change it any way you want to.

I will tell you that the one that is going to be tough and may be hard to convince them of is the one where we are -- remember the eight hours reduced to four hour thing? We will really have to do some work on that one, because it's going to look like we are reducing it when everybody in the world wants to add.

19 If you maybe take a look at it or keep it with you 20 and we can move on and call us if you want to make some 21 changes.

Do you want to tell whether the.

MS. AUCOIN: I mean, basically, y'all requested, I believe, amendments to five separate statutes relating to soliciting business, who is required to take the

examination, the training, who has to submit the training 1 certificate to the board, and relating to reporting 2 discharging of firearms. 3 So, like Mr. Blackburn said, please review it and 4 let me know if I did or did not capture what y'all were 5 looking for. 6 MR. ROMERO: Do you think the problem that we 7 may have with the training is because we specifically 8 stated four hours rather than making it a 9 curriculum-based training? 10 MR. BLACKBURN: Yes. But then that leads to the 11 problem of what they are going to actually do. 12 MS. AUCOIN: Right, because curriculum-based 13 could be 15 minutes. 14 So, I mean, your call on MR. BLACKBURN: Yes. 15 how you want to do it. Maybe we leave eight hours in, 16 which would comply with the curriculum-based training, 17 something like that. 18 But what would happen if the 19 MR. ROMERO: curriculum-based training took less than eight hours? 20 MR. BLACKBURN: Well, that was kind of the 21 2.2 qoal. MS. RYLAND: That's what it is now. 23 MR. BLACKBURN: Well, no. 24 25 MS. RYLAND: Or are you talking about eight

1	hours all totaled for first and second?
2	MR. BLACKBURN: No. My understanding is that,
3	now, you teach for eight hours allegedly. But what is
4	happening is, they are finishing in four hours.
5	MS. RYLAND: Correct.
6	MR. BLACKBURN: So maybe, in this piece of
7	legislation, you can say in eight hours or
8	curriculum-based or something like that.
9	MR. ROGILLIO: Mr. Romero, we are having a lot
10	of the instructors complain that they have two people in
11	the class and they can finish in four, four and a half,
12	five hours and, the other three hours, they are just
13	going to sit there once they have taken the test and
14	everything. So I think that's the reason that all of
15	this was discussed with the board for us to try to come
16	to some kind of agreement where, if you had one or two
17	people in the class, that you wouldn't have to sit there
18	for another three or four hours. That's basically what
19	it was about, so.
20	MR. BLACKBURN: And to be on the other side of
21	that is, that really doesn't make sense to me, because,
22	if you are teaching a class, except for questions at the
23	end of the class, what's the difference in the number of
24	hours? Yes. I mean, how long it goes if it's two guys
25	or ten guys?

1	MS. AUCOIN: Yes. Because the class
2	MS. RYLAND: That's a common that's a common
3	complaint all the time. And, really, if they have ten
4	guys, they still just teach it in four hours sometimes.
5	I mean, we have a lot of complaints on that. For the
6	last ten years, we have been having that.
7	MR. ROMERO: So the issue is with the
8	curriculum, not with the time frame.
9	MS. VINSON: Or the issue is with the
10	instructors maybe not knowing enough of the topic to fill
11	in the two hours.
12	MR. DUPLECHAIN: But if you have a class I
13	know I used to teach classes you might have six, seven
14	people in one class and two of them are asking a lot of
15	questions which will drag the class on. Sometimes you go
16	eight, nine hours. But if you have two people in the
17	class and they are pretty well-educated, they pick that
18	stuff up fast and you're not going to stay two hours on a
19	subject that they already got in an hour.
20	MS. RYLAND: And I can tell you, probably
21	80 percent of the instructors have mentioned this to us.
22	MR. DUPLECHAIN: Yes.
23	MR. ROGILLIO: If you remember, we changed the
24	12 hours for the firearms because of that same situation.
25	MR. DUPLECHAIN: But if you put eight hours or

the curriculum-based, that should cover it. It's eight 1 hours for sure, and as long as you are teaching the 2 curriculum in five hours, then you're okay. 3 MR. BLACKBURN: Or the curriculum-based 4 approved. 5 Approved curriculum-based. MR. KENNEDY: 6 But you are just speaking of the MR. BAER: 7 first eight hours, correct? 8 MR. BLACKBURN: Yes. 9 MR. BAER: That's all that's listed on here? 10 MR. BLACKBURN: I thought. 11 MS. RYLAND: No. You're talking about both of 12 them. 13 MR. BAER: You're still going to have first and 14 second. 15 MS. VINSON: First and second. 16 The second eight hours is usually MS. RYLAND: 17 based on the company, you know. 18 MR. BAFR: 19 Yes. MR. KENNEDY: But you must approve the 20 training. 21 MS. RYLAND: Exactly. Wayne approved it. 2.2 MR. KENNEDY: So if we made it curriculum-based, 2.3 we'd make it approved curriculum-based, meaning the board 24 staff has to agree, this subject matter is appropriate 25

and is enough --1 MS. RYLAND: Right. 2 MR. KENNEDY: -- to give the officer a basic 3 knowledge of the security industry. And if they want to 4 exceed that, that's fine. 5 MS. RYLAND: Right, yes. If you want to go 6 eight hours the second eight hours, that's your business. 7 But it's beginning to be a problem. And the instructors' 8 concern is, if I don't keep them there eight hours, what 9 kind of trouble am I going to get into? 10 MR. DUPLECHAIN: But if we do it the way they 11 were saying, with eight hours or based --12 MS. RYLAND: Curriculum. 13 MR. DUPLECHAIN: -- curriculum, that should 14 cover us. We shouldn't have to do anything other than 15 that. We would probably have a better chance of having 16 it approved. 17 MR. KENNEDY: What do you think, Frank? 18 I mean, I like it better that 19 MR. BLACKBURN: way. You know, we have a 20-week academy. All you have 20 to have is eight to be POST-certified. 21 MR. ROMERO: And I think that comes with the 2.2 cost of doing business for those companies that choose to 2.3 go beyond just as companies currently that choose to go 24 beyond the minimum standards. I think it's important 25

1	that we do whatever is necessary to get it passed if that
2	is the general feeling of everyone here and, if it's your
3	recommendation that we make a change, have a better
4	chance of passing it, I think we should entertain that.
5	MR. KENNEDY: I agree. If we think the "or" and
6	we add "approved curriculum-based," it would give us a
7	better chance of passing than the wording we have now, I
8	would think that's what we need to look at.
9	MS. VINSON: That's on the second page.
10	MR. DUPLECHAIN: I agree.
11	MS. RYLAND: That would be for the second eight
12	hours. The first eight hours is already stated in the
13	law what they get.
14	MS. VINSON: No. But we are looking at changing
15	that as well, based on this.
16	MR. KENNEDY: We want the wording to be the same
17	for both of them, "eight hours," which is what it is now,
18	"or the approved curriculum-based."
19	MR. BLACKBURN: We can make that change as you
20	so desire.
21	MR. DUPLECHAIN: I think that would be the best
22	way to pass it.
23	MS. VINSON: Is there a motion for that?
24	MR. KENNEDY: I'll make the motion.
25	MR. ROJAS: Second.

1	MS. VINSON: Any discussion?
2	MR. BAER: Yes. Question: You're talking about
3	going from 16 to 8?
4	MR. ROGILLIO: No.
5	MR. BAER: You're going from 16 to 4?
6	MS. VINSON: No.
7	MR. ROGILLIO: I'm talking about, actually, it's
8	still the 16 hours, but it would be based on the
9	curriculum. And, again, if there's 2 people in the class
10	or 3 people in the class as opposed to 10 or 15
11	MS. VINSON: Right.
12	MR. ROGILLIO: it's just enabling that
13	instructor to teach the course that he or she has
14	described to us and then pass those people on.
15	MS. RYLAND: The magic word is "or."
16	MS. VINSON: Yes. So it could be an hour, it
17	could be nine hours.
18	MR. BAER: So you can do it in four hours.
19	MR. DUPLECHAIN: You can do it in 4, you can do
20	it in 8, you can do it in 10.
21	MR. BAER: So you're going from 16 hours to 4.
22	MS. VINSON: No.
23	MS. RYLAND: Four hours per curriculum.
24	MR. ROMERO: Sixteen hours to curriculum-based.
25	MR. BAER: Okay. So you're taking all that

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out. What's minimum? 1 MS. VINSON: Curriculum-based. 2 MR. ROMERO: Curriculum-based. You have to 3 teach the curriculum. 4 MS. RYLAND: That's the same thing they do on 5 the firearms. There's no more firearms hours. Tt's 6 curriculum-based, and we have that. 7 It really could be abused. MR. BLACKBURN: Т 8 see that "abuse" look on your face. It could be abused. 9 MS. VINSON: People could do a one-hour class. 10 MR. BLACKBURN: Or 30 minutes, you know. You 11 could bring them in and say --12 MR. DUPLECHAIN: Every instructor is doing it 13 now. You're not going to sit there for eight hours with 14 one person if that one person takes everything in and he 15 can pass the test successfully. 16 MR. BAER: He should be, should be doing eight 17 hours. 18 I think you have a safeguard here 19 MR. KENNEDY: for the abuse, don't we, if you're having to give them an 20 examination that's 50 questions or greater. If you spend 21 a half an hour with them, you are not covering all the 2.2 subject matter, they are not going to pass that exam, 2.3 unless you are going to cheat. And that's where we are 24 going to catch them in audit. So I think you have a 25

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safeguard to agree by the testing procedure that we do.
If you don't cover the information, they are not going to
pass the test.
MS. RYLAND: Maybe you could go up on the number

of the questions on the test to 75. MR. BLACKBURN: Stop. Let's don't go any further.

MS. RYLAND: Well.

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9 MR. KENNEDY: I think 50 would be adequate, 10 because, when they submit a curriculum for the second 11 eight hours, they also submit a test for you, and you 12 have to approve it, that it covers enough of all of that 13 subject matter to qualify the (inaudible) --

MS. RYLAND: And, actually, most of them --14 MR. KENNEDY: Yours is already done for the 15 first eight hours, so I think you have already covered 16 that. And that does give us some assurance and no 17 quarantee any time that you can avoid abuse. Anything 18 can be abused if you really set your mind to it. But if 19 we make a reasonable effort to limit or reduce that 20 opportunity -- and I think the test does that. 21

22 MR. BLACKBURN: Maybe we could go back to -- you 23 know, we used to send --

MR. KENNEDY: Someone to audit the class. MR. BLACKBURN: -- decoys in -- sit in the

1 || class.

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MR. KENNEDY: Yes.

MS. RYLAND: And we will be auditing instructors really soon, so.

T think we have some MR. KENNEDY: Yes. 5 safequards here that we can use, because I agree. If 6 I've got two people in a class and they were experienced 7 security officers, they are already familiar with the 8 information that I'm training them on. There are going 9 to be fewer questions and answers. The Q and A part of 10 it is going to be a lot less. The instructor, if he is 11 doing his job, is paying attention to his students to 12 begin with: Are they grasping this information? And, if 13 not, he has to slow down and make sure that he is 14 teaching to the level of his students. So if he is doing 15 the right thing, again, it won't take him eight hours for 16 two people. It might take him six. It might take him 17 seven. I've had a class where I had four people, and it 18 took me nine hours because they were slow. 19

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MS. RYLAND: Right.

MR. KENNEDY: So, I mean, again, I don't know that there is a magic answer to it, but I think we do need to see -- we do need to try to find some sort of solution for this.

MS. VINSON: Well, we have a motion on the

1	floor. So do we want to do a roll call vote?
2	MR. DUPLECHAIN: Yes.
3	MR. BAER: Can you repeat the motion.
4	MS. VINSON: Yes. Can we repeat the motion.
5	MR. KENNEDY: The motion would be to change the
6	current qualifications or the current regulations to
7	state "eight hours or approved curriculum-based training
8	course."
9	MS. RYLAND: Roll call vote?
10	MS. VINSON: Yes, please.
11	(Ms. Ryland polls board members.)
12	MR. BAER: No.
13	MR. COTTON: Yes.
14	MR. DUPLECHAIN: Yes.
15	MR. KENNEDY: Yes.
16	MR. ROMERO: Yes.
17	MS. VINSON: No.
18	MS. RYLAND: It passes.
19	MR. ROJAS: You skipped me.
20	MS. RYLAND: Oh, did I? I'm sorry, Mr. Rojas.
21	MR. ROJAS: Yes.
22	MS. RYLAND: I'm sorry.
23	MR. BLACKBURN: The story of your life. All
24	right. The other items that are in the bill, is
25	everybody good with those? Are we ready to go?

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1	MS. AUCOIN: There was one item that's not on
2	there, I think, that came up yesterday, was the,
3	possibly, a \$50 penalty for an instructor who fails to
4	submit the training certificates within 15 days. I was
5	looking at whether or not y'all would want to put it in
6	the statute or add it as an administrative penalty if
7	possible there, so. I wanted you to let y'all know
8	that.
9	MS. VINSON: Aren't all of our fines as
10	administrative penalties, though?
11	MR. BLACKBURN: Yes.
12	MS. VINSON: So would it be cleaner just to add
13	it underneath there?
14	MR. BLACKBURN: Yes. We've always had to file
15	them as you know, you can only do administrative
16	penalties or administrative anything if you have
17	legislative authority. So the legislative authority on
18	all that has always been gray, so let's just leave it
19	gray.
20	MS. VINSON: Okay. So do we want to talk about
21	that, then, now as a rule change or?
22	MR. BLACKBURN: Yes. We will work on that and
23	bring it to you.
24	OLD BUSINESS, STATUS REPORTS
25	MS. VINSON: Okay. Is that it? Item No. 5, Old

Business, Status Report. 1 MR. ROGILLIO: You should have those in your 2 packets, and financials. 3 MS. VINSON: Does anyone have any questions on 4 the officer statuses? 5 MR. ROGILLIO: The numbers are pretty much 6 staying about the same. 7 Did we get all that work done on MS. VINSON: 8 the building? Didn't we have some bids to get some work 9 done? 10 MR. ROGILLIO: We are battling the city-parish 11 right now. You would think I was building an office 12 complex, because it's been a nightmare. Okay? It's been 13 a real nightmare. 14 The garage for the van. MS. RYLAND: 15 MR. ROGILLIO: Yes. We are waiting. Because 16 there's a power line, they've got to have Entergy come 17 out and tell us whether or not we can put the building 18 here. 19 MS. VINSON: A servitude for it. 20 MS. RYLAND: That answer should be tomorrow. 21 MR. ROGILLIO: Yes. We're away from the 2.2 property -- everything else is okay, except that power 23 line. As soon as Entergy gives me the okay, then I will 24 25 go down and get the permit and we will start, so.

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1	MC VINCON. Anothing also under that 2
1	MS. VINSON: Anything else under that?
2	MR. ROGILLIO: No. I do well, I'll let you
3	guys decide on the approval of those reports, and then I
4	have a question too.
5	MS. VINSON: Is there a motion to approve the
6	office status report?
7	MR. DUPLECHAIN: I will make a motion.
8	MS. VINSON: Do I have a second?
9	MR. KENNEDY: Second.
10	MS. VINSON: Any questions/debate? Motion to
11	accept.
12	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
13	OLD BUSINESS, FINANCIAL REPORT
14	MS. VINSON: Financial Report, any questions?
15	MR. ROGILLIO: By the way, we have ordered the
16	prints machine. There again, there was a red tape trail
17	to get to that point, but we have ordered it. So we are
18	expecting it soon, I'm sure.
19	MS. RYLAND: Hopefully set up by the middle of
20	March.
21	MR. ROGILLIO: Where we will be able to scan
22	prints in a live scan and send them electronically to
23	state police and not have to go over there every day or
24	every couple of days.
25	MS. RYLAND: We should have a 48-hour return.

1	MR. ROGILLIO: Yes. If they are good prints.
2	MS. VINSON: Is there a motion to accept the
3	financial report?
4	MR. ROMERO: So moved.
5	MS. VINSON: Second?
6	MR. KENNEDY: Second.
7	MS. VINSON: Any discussion/questions? All in
8	favor.
9	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
10	MR. ROGILLIO: You may have to amend the
11	agenda. I need two items I need to talk about to you
12	folks if you don't mind doing that, things that came in
13	after we set up the board meeting, so if you want to take
14	a vote.
15	MS. VINSON: Okay. Do I have a motion to amend
16	the agenda?
17	MR. DUPLECHAIN: I will make that motion.
18	MS. VINSON: Second?
19	MR. ROJAS: Second.
20	MS. VINSON: All in favor.
21	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
22	NEW BUSINESS, WIDENING OF OLD HAMMOND HIGHWAY
23	MR. ROGILLIO: The first matter is, I received a
24	call from a consultant who informed me that they are
25	going to widen this street out here, Old Hammond. And he

1	said this is the first step, to call you and let you know
2	that, because the next step will be, send a letter, which
3	he did.
4	Did you put that in the packet?
5	MS. RYLAND: Yes.
6	MR. ROGILLIO: But the question I have for you
7	folks, they are going to send an appraiser out here to
8	appraise the property that they are going to take from
9	us. And I want to know, do y'all want to make that
10	decision, or do you want to let me make that decision so
11	that I get clearance if you so authorize me
12	MS. VINSON: It's eminent domain where they can
13	take it and tell us what it's worth. I don't think we
14	have any room to negotiate.
15	MR. ROGILLIO: No. They're going to get the
16	property, there's no question. But there's a question as
17	to how much value is going to be placed on whatever they
18	take. So, again, if you authorize me to accept or not
19	accept or whatever, then I will use my judgment on that,
20	or if you want me to bring it back to the board.
21	MR. DUPLECHAIN: I will make a motion, then, to
22	authorize you to accept it. We have no alternative
23	anyway.
24	MR. BAER: Second.
25	MR. BLACKBURN: Well, you do have an

alternative. You can object and sue, fight, and you will 1 lose. 2 MR. ROGILLIO: And spend a lot of money. 3 MR. DUPLECHAIN: We have done that before. We 4 won, but lost. 5 MR. KENNEDY: We lose. 6 MS. VINSON: So we have a motion with a second. 7 All in favor? 8 ALL BOARD MEMBERS: 9 Ave. NEW BUSINESS, REQUEST FOR SPECIAL MEETING 10 MR. ROGILLIO: The next matter is -- I don't 11 want to discuss the case, but I do need to ask if you 12 would consider maybe a special meeting. This was a 13 situation we ran across. We have to notify the company 14 15 days out before we can bring them before the board, by 15 law. 16 We had a company that was operating in New Orleans 17 on one of the wharves down there, and -- since '06, after 18 Katrina. And the lady was licensed, but nobody was 19 registered. And, anyway, I issued a Cease and Desist 20 Order to shut her down. And she pleaded her case. 21 And I said, "Ma'am, I have to do what the law tells 2.2 me to do. You have nobody registered." 2.3 So do you want to consider a special meeting to hear 24 25 her matter, or do you want me to wait until next time? Ι

feel like she is in a bind, maybe, because of not being 1 able to operate. 2 MS. VINSON: She is in a bind because she didn't 3 follow the law. 4 MR. ROGILLIO: Right. I'm just giving you all 5 the details. 6 MR. ROMERO: I know, under the emergency 7 declarations, there are things that we do to allow the 8 companies to be licensed sooner. Is there a mechanism 9 that we have in place to terminate those arrangements? 10 Is there anything formal in place? Is there a time frame 11 that we would have to submit? 12 MR. ROGILLIO: Yes. 13 MR. ROMERO: Has that been satisfied? 14 MR. ROGILLIO: If the Governor issues an 15 emergency order, they can come in, but they can only stay 16 within 30 days after that or it's expired. 17 MR. DUPLECHAIN: She has been operating since 18 2006 with not --19 MS. RYLAND: She has been operating under a 20 Cease and Desist. 21 MR. ROGILLIO: Mr. Thornton checked one of her 2.2 quards, and he had a temporary card for '06, and he is 2.3 not registered. And she had four or five other people 24 25 who were working.

1	MR. DUPLECHAIN: None of them are registered?
2	MR. ROGILLIO: No, no registered.
3	MR. DUPLECHAIN: I will say make her wait till
4	next meeting.
5	MR. ROGILLIO: Well, I just need to know so I
6	can call her back and let her know.
7	MR. DUPLECHAIN: I will make a motion that that
8	will be put off till our next meeting.
9	MS. VINSON: Do I hear a second?
10	MR. BAER: Second.
11	MR. ROMERO: Second. I have a question: Is
12	this company armed or unarmed?
13	MR. ROGILLIO: Unarmed.
14	MS. VINSON: Okay. All in favor?
15	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
16	MR. ROGILLIO: Okay. That's really all I had if
17	you want to go back to the adjudicatories.
18	MS. VINSON: Okay. Based on the two hearings,
19	we need to go into executive session.
20	MR. ROGILLIO: Yes, ma'am.
21	MS. VINSON: So we need everyone to please clear
22	the room.
23	(Off the record discussion.)
24	MS. VINSON: Frank, do we need a motion to go
25	into executive session?

1	MR. BLACKBURN: Yes.
2	MS. VINSON: We need a motion to go into
3	executive session.
4	MR. ROMERO: So moved.
5	MR. DUPLECHAIN: Second.
6	MR. KENNEDY: Second.
7	MS. VINSON: All in favor?
8	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
9	(Executive Session begins at 10:01 a.m.)
10	(Executive session closes at 11:09 a.m.)
11	(Recess.)
12	(Open session begins at 11:16 a.m.)
13	MS. VINSON: Back on the record. Counsel.
14	MR. BLACKBURN: We are having our legal
15	argument.
16	MS. VINSON: Do we have any New Business?
17	MR. ROGILLIO: No, ma'am. Actually, we
18	basically covered that with the road improvement and the
19	D & M (inaudible) matter.
