TRANSCRIPT OF PROCEEDINGS 1 2 MS. VINSON: I will call to order the Louisiana 3 State Board meeting. First thing, if you wouldn't mind 4 leading us in the Pledge, Mr. Rogillio, and followed by a 5 brief moment of silence. 6 (Pledge of Allegiance and brief moment of silence.) 7 MS. VINSON: Do we have a quorum? 8 MR. KENNEDY: Yes. Right now we do. 9 MS. VINSON: Second item on the agenda, Reading 10 of the Minutes From the Previous Meeting. 11 MR. ROJAS: I make a motion to dispense with the 12 reading. 13 MR. ROMERO: Second 14 MR. KENNEDY: Second. 15 MS. VINSON: All in favor? Motion passes. 16 NEW BUSINESS, MISCELLANEOUS, DISCUSSION OF AUDIT 17 MR. ROGILLIO: Can we amend the agenda and move 18 down to the New Business so we can get Mr. McRight and 19 his wife out of here? MS. VINSON: Okay. So we're going to go to New 20 Business under the audit. 21 2.2 MR. BLACKBURN: You need a motion, two-thirds 23 vote to be able to do that. 24 MS. VINSON: Do I have a motion to amend the 25 agenda?

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1	MR. ROMERO: So moved.
2	MS. VINSON: Do I have a second?
3	MR. ROJAS: Second.
4	MS. VINSON: Any discussion? All in favor?
5	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
6	MS. VINSON: Any opposed? Motion passes.
7	MR. ROGILLIO: Okay. The first item under that
8	Miscellaneous is the audit of his office, discussion by
9	Mr. McRight explaining that auditor's report. Ready,
10	Mr. McRight?
11	MR. MCRIGHT: We basically have three items to
12	go over with. There's three separate reports y'all
13	should have in your folder. One of them has the bold
14	type with about thirty pages. It says Louisiana State
15	Board, and the other one says Louisiana State Board,
16	Department of Public Safety. We'll go through the one
17	for the Department of Public Safety first.
18	What this is, the legislative auditors contract with
19	a CPA to come in and do some agreed-upon procedures.
20	Those procedures are listed out in his report, but
21	basically they're telling him that he has to look at so
22	many invoices, pick so many employees, and go through the
23	time cards and review certain reports and bank statements
24	and stuff like that.
25	So he went through all of that. He found no real

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findings, other than we have a repeat finding on the 1 2 budget -- well, the first repeat finding was, not all 3 bank reconciliations were signed off in by management. 4 What happens on those is, Sharon does them, sends 5 them to me. I review them, send them back. And at that 6 time, they should be signed off on by either Wayne or 7 We did pretty good for about half a year, then we Jane. 8 messed up and didn't get the last half done. Okay? It's 9 really just a technicality, because they were reviewed 10 and they were all proper. We just didn't follow the 11 procedures that they recommend.

We have agreed and put into place the way we're going to make sure they're signed this year immediately before they come to me. And I'll know that someone in management has looked at them. I'll look over them and bring them back to you for filing. We think that will take care of that problem and avoid a repeat finding for next year.

19 The other finding that he had was, whenever we 20 prepare a budget and we bring it to the board for 21 approval, we submit that board (sic) to the -- I can't 22 think of the name of that -- through the business 23 administration. The financial advisory board has to have 24 a copy of that budget. We submit that copy to them. 25 But whenever y'all amend the budget, like we did with the

budget we submitted for June 30th, we were supposed to submit that copy to them. So part of the finding is, we didn't submit the copy.

4 The other part of the finding was that there was a 5 difference in the amount that y'all approved and the 6 amount that we submitted electronically to them. And 7 that was an oversight on our part. There was a hectic --8 this thing takes -- it's like 30 separate screens you 9 have to go through, and they all add back up to come up 10 to the top. And somehow or another, we failed to match 11 them up at the end to everything.

So there was a discrepancy in the amount that was submitted for an amended budget. And that's what the finding was. It's really more technical in nature than being a real problem. It's just that he suggested we review them a little closer in the future to make sure that everything is balancing out on that.

So, basically, I think that -- the report is submitted by Mike Glover. Agreed-upon procedures, I recommended y'all accept it as presented and response by management being approved by y'all also.

MS. VINSON: Okay. When we do that, are we approving all three of these packets, or are we going to go through each one individually?

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MR. MCRIGHT: Well, we can do them all at once.

1 They are basically the same thing. The next packet is a 2 packet we submitted to the Division of Administration 3 through the Legislative Auditor's Office. And what it 4 is, is the financial statement as of June 30th are 5 prepared on a accrual type basis. This basis is like you 6 were doing a regular business.

7 The main difference between what the way the company 8 keeps its books for audit purposes and for budget 9 purposes is that the balance sheet does not include, on 10 the fund basis, does not include any assets or 11 depreciation or any accrual for other post-retirement 12 benefits. That's that big number that gets put in there 13 every year. This year, that number is up to 587,000.

14 That is not required on fund basis or on budgetary 15 basis. So the State of Louisiana uses your information 16 in their audit report, so we have to pick that up on this 17 financial statements on a, what they call, net asset 18 basis, which is really the accrual basis. So that is the 19 only difference between that and the way the company 20 keeps its everyday books. So provisions are made at June 30th of each year to set up these and report to the 21 2.2 Division of Administration.

There were really no findings or anything. The loss, the accrual basis, is 83,558, and that's caused by a change in that \$587,000 from last year. We accrued

that amount. There's an additional amount each year, and 1 2 it keeps rising. Since we don't pay it off, we just keep 3 accruing it, and, some day, they may come up 4 with regulations and we have to start paying on it. But, 5 right now, there's no requirements to do that. So, 6 really, it's just a liability for the State of Louisiana, 7 not necessarily something that's going to have to be paid 8 off immediately by the board. 9 And the rest of it back over in the footnotes are 10 standard footnotes that we have every year. It breaks 11 down the assets, what we have for accounts receivable, 12 what we -- the amount of depreciation we have, how much 13 we added, and how much we took out. And so all that is 14 included in there in that part of it. 15 To better understand it, though, we have a third 16 report, which is the two pages that were handed out to 17 you this morning. What this page is, this is the income 18 revenues and expenses versus actual -- versus budget June 30th, '15. 19 The big thing to note on here is that we 20 had \$875,000 worth of operating revenues come in during 21 the year, and most of that was through fees. Fines and 2.2 stuff, of that 875, were 127,000, and the fingerprint 23 income was 85,000. So you see everything else was just 24 through the operating fee of guard renewals, 25 administrative fees, and that type of stuff. Everything

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1	y'all charge a fee for goes into that.
2	Now, we also have a nonoperating fund transfer. I
3	don't know if y'all remember or not, but when we did the
4	budget amendment at the last board meeting, y'all
5	approved a transfer fund, retained earnings, to cover a
6	shortfall because of the purchase of the computers and
7	stuff. So that amount, which y'all agreed to let us take
8	up to \$90,000 of retained earnings, so we put that
9	into as a nonoperating revenue to show that we have
10	\$965,000 worth of funds available to cover expenses.
11	Now, when we go to expenses, our expenses for the
12	year were 982,000, and so that leaves us, on a budgetary
13	basis, a loss of about \$17,000, right at well, I guess
14	closer to eighteen, seventeen seven. We don't expect to
15	have that loss this coming year. We're hoping that our
16	revenues will pick back up a little bit and we will be
17	able to offset it. We budgeted for a break-even right
18	now for the coming year.
19	The expenses are, if you take away salary, if you
20	add up all the salaries and benefits of the employees,
21	they cover about 77 percent of the total expenses of the
22	982,000. So you can see that that doesn't leave a whole
23	lot to do other things with.
24	The big items in the rest of it were professional
25	fees. We spent about \$56,000 on the accounting fees, the

computer update, the web sites, all that stuff is all --1 2 the court reporter. I think the computer contractor is 3 another big deal, so that totals about \$56,000. 4 And, let's see, anything else? Oh, purchase of 5 equipment last year, we purchased \$64,700 worth of 6 computer equipment. We don't expect to have to expend 7 that this year. And that's the reason we projected that next year that we will have a little bit of a profit and 8 9 start replacing some of that (inaudible) cash we took 10 away. 11 MR. ROJAS: Why the expense -- can you explain 12 the insurance group benefits of 50,038.88? 13 Sharon has left. We have a big MR. MCRIGHT: 14 increase in that, premiums. And that's the main reason 15 for it. 16 MS. RYLAND: What is that? I'm sorry? 17 MR. MCRIGHT: Office of Group Benefits. The 18 change from last year to this year went up. 19 MS. RYLAND: Oh, we have like a 12 percent 20 projected increase in premiums, and then we'll have to 21 pay -- the state portion will be that much, because it 2.2 went up tremendously. 23 MR. MCRIGHT: Now, we were projecting to go down 24 because of the number of retirees and stuff have gone 25 down.

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MS. RYLAND: Right. 1 2 MR. MCRIGHT: And that's the reason we've 3 projected to go down. And they've changed some of the 4 rules how they're calculating the change also. So it's 5 really a paper deal. It's a onetime deal we were high 6 based upon prior year statistics, and they're starting to 7 qo down. So, hopefully, we'll be able to keep it in 8 The state has changed some of the way they line. 9 calculate the benefits and changed insurance plans that 10 are available to the employees. So that was the reason 11 they're going down. 12 And, basically, that's the way we were in June 30th. 13 And overall, with the cost, if wasn't for the computers, we would have been a little above break even. 14 It 15 wouldn't have been a great year, but it wouldn't have 16 been a loss year either. So it's just that going to the 17 paperless system required that we update all the 18 computers in the office all at one time instead of 19 gradually doing it. That was the main reason for going 20 to a deficit this year. 21 MS. VINSON: Any questions? May I have a 2.2 motion? 23 MR. ROMERO: I make a motion that we accept the 24 report and recommendations as presented and authorize the

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board staff and our accountant to go forward with

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monitoring those as on a go forward basis. 1 2 MR. ROJAS: Second. 3 MR. KENNEDY: Second. 4 MS. VINSON: Any discussion? All in favor? 5 ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Ave. 6 MS. VINSON: Any opposed? Motion passes. 7 Mr. Rogillio. 8 MR. ROMERO: Thank you. 9 MR. MCRIGHT: Thank y'all. We appreciate it. 10 MS. VINSON: Is that the only item we needed to 11 go off the agenda on? 12 NEW BUSINESS, MISCELLANEOUS, UNIFORM PATCH 13 MR. ROGILLIO: No, ma'am. Item 2 and 3 are 14 under that same category. 15 MS. VINSON: Okay. All in New Business? MR. ROGILLIO: Yes, ma'am. Mr. Burke is the 16 17 owner of Tectus Security. He is here. 18 MS. VINSON: Okay. 19 MR. ROGILLIO: He has requested to use the state 20 seal in his patch, which I discussed with Mr. Blackburn. 21 Mr. Blackburn said it was prohibited. So I will let Mr. Blackburn address that. 2.2 23 You can speak if you would like. 24 MR. BLACKBURN: He can speak if he would like. 25 He has a badge that has a State of Louisiana seal in it.

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1	We've never allowed that to pass, and we've interpreted
2	the statute says that it shall not look official as the
3	reason to do that. And I think we should continue to do
4	that.
5	MR. ROMERO: Anything you'd like to share with
6	us regarding that?
7	MR. BURKE: Yes. I spoke with my counsel a few
8	times, and there is no discrepancy that the 112 statute
9	that interprets as being from a law enforcement agency.
10	The reason for the seal is, I was initially in contract
11	with Entergy, who covered Texas, Mississippi, Arkansas,
12	Louisiana. And the way they broke the divisions down was
13	Louisiana state seal, Texas state seal, Mississippi, and
14	Arkansas. And that contract came and went, and I just
15	kept with the seal.
16	I have uniforms that have a patch, have a print
17	work, and we advertise at the airport. We do a lot of
18	work in the film business. And we sponsor the New
19	Orleans Film Fest and have all that print work going up.
20	We've got to prepare.
21	MS. VINSON: Do you have our statute handy on
22	how it reads?
23	MR. BURKE: It's under the R.S. 14:112,
24	impersonating a police officer.
25	COURT REPORTER: I can't hear you.

MR. BURKE: I believe it's under R.S. 14:112, 1 2 impersonating a police officer. And one is subordinate 3 subparagraphs. 4 MR. BLACKBURN: Yes, but that's not the one we 5 use. We use one of these. Do you know it, Wayne, 6 offhand? 7 MR. ROGILLIO: No, I don't. 8 MR. BLACKBURN: In the private security law, 9 there's a paragraph that says something to that effect. 10 MR. ROGILLIO: Number 3290. 11 MR. ROMERO: Excuse me. How long have you been 12 utilizing this badge and patch in the state of Louisiana? 13 MR. BURKE: We transitioned from a green and 14 silver to the gold. I don't remember the dates. Mv 15 office administrator is no longer with the company. 16 She's been separated. The computers used during the 17 training to send e-mails back and forth has been cleaned 18 and donated to the Battered Women's Shelter. I had 19 mentioned that to Miss Jane, I couldn't recover any of 20 the -- any print work, anything along that lines to 21 validate actually when the start date of it. 2.2 Originally, I had the Tectus management gold badges 23 made when I first started the company, but I never 24 actually put that into print. It went with the green 25 circle and silver falcon and star in the middle. And it

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said Tectus Security Services on it too. The transition 1 2 to the gold, I don't know the exact date and time frames. 3 MR. ROMERO: Can you give me an approximate 4 date? Has it been a month --5 MR. BURKE: On, no, sir. 6 MR. ROMERO: Has it been a year? Has it been 7 two years? 8 MR. BURKE: No. It's been probably two and a 9 half, three years minimum, I'd say, minimum. 10 MR. ROMERO: And, please, board staff, maybe, 11 please correct me if I'm wrong, but it's my understanding 12 that any time we roll out a new uniform and patch, anything along those lines, we're supposed to provide 13 14 that information to the board for approval. Is that 15 correct? 16 That's against my black eye, MR. BURKE: Yeah. 17 because my communication outside, I asked Jane Doe to do 18 it and I want you to give me a price on insignias. I 19 said, all right, let's roll with it. Everything, I'd 20 say, was good. We rolled forward with it. 21 MR. ROMERO: And while I'm certainly sensitive 2.2 to the cost associated with updating and getting you 23 patches, uniforms, and so forth, it's as Mr. Blackburn 24 has mentioned, and I think they are looking for that part 25 of the statute that identifies that, but it's my

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understanding that we're restricted in what we can 1 2 And if, in fact, that is the case, then our approve. 3 hands are tied. 4 MR. BURKE: And I was just made aware that 5 Mr. -- said -- what is it, that 3237 statute? 6 MR. BLACKBURN: It's 32. It's 37:3290. Ιf 7 you'd like, I will read some parts of it: 8 "With the exception of sworn police (sic) 9 officers in...uniform, no individual, while performing the duties of security officer, 10 11 shall wear or display any badge, insignia, 12 device, shield, patch, or pattern which shall 13 indicate or tend to indicate...he is a sworn 14 police (sic) officer, or which contains or includes the word 'police' or the 15 16 equivalent...or is similar in wording to any law 17 enforcement agency in this state". 18 And it goes on. 19 "A copy of such badges...shall be submitted 20 for approval...shall...full length picture 21 shall...any vehicle..." It talks about the same kind of stuff. 2.2 23 "No (sic) military style uniforms, except 24 for rainwear, shall have...affixed...over (sic) 25 the sleeve.

1	"Suppliers of uniforms shall be prohibited
2	from the saleof uniforms, badges, or
3	insigniaslaw enforcement agency without
4	appropriate"
5	And that's the statute we have always used to not
6	use official State of Louisiana police stuff. There is
7	some gray area there, I admit, but.
8	MR. ROMERO: So I guess your opinion, your legal
9	opinion, based on utilizing the official seal, would be
10	outside of what's acceptable with the statute?
11	MR. BLACKBURN: That's correct.
12	MR. BURKE: I relied on my in-house counsel,
13	Thompson, and I put my faith in him, so.
14	MR. BLACKBURN: Well, he was in the wrong
15	statute, it sounded like. He was in Title 14. This is a
16	specific statute.
17	MR. BURKE: It doesn't mention whether an
18	officer doesn't state you can or can't use the state
19	seal. My badge says Tectus Security Services in bold
20	letters around the rim in a certain section of the badge.
21	COURT REPORTER: I need you to speak up, please.
22	I can't hear you.
23	MR. BURKE: I'm fighting a cold. I'm sorry.
24	What did you need me to repeat, ma'am?
25	COURT REPORTER: The last sentence. "Officer

doesn't state you can or can't use the state seal. I 1 2 have Tectus Security Services, bold letters, around the 3 rim." 4 MR. BURKE: Yes. Tectus Security Services are 5 around the circular part of the badge. It specifically 6 states "security." It doesn't say enforcement or any 7 other, I guess, title that you would interpret as a 8 police officer. 9 MR. BLACKBURN: And, you know, there may be a 10 state statute that I can go research it if y'all want me 11 to, that you can't use the state seal anywhere, not just 12 in private security, except state agencies. 13 MS. VINSON: And that's the impression I get 14 when I see this. Even though it says Security Services, 15 I have the impression that it's a representation of the 16 state. 17 Initially, it's what it was from my MR. BURKE: 18 division, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and --19 MR. KENNEDY: It looks official. MS. VINSON: But it looks official. 20 21 MR. BURKE: (Inaudible) \$425 an hour from my --2.2 MS. VINSON: Right. 23 MR. ROJAS: If you remember, years ago, there 24 was a company in New Orleans. He had a star and a 25 Crescent. We made him take it off, because it resembled

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1	New Orleans Police Department's badge.
2	MR. BURKE: I know I'm a former state
3	trooper. I know I couldn't put that on it. And I
4	initialed on that logo, some of the state the gold
5	boot, and I know I couldn't put the state seal on a gold
6	boot, because that's too close.
7	MR. ROJAS: He never did. He just had the
8	badge, the star and crescent, just like the NOPD.
9	MR. BURKE: I try not no resemble NOPD at all.
10	Excuse me.
11	MR. ROMERO: But I think, you know, also, as you
12	mentioned, there's a process in place in advance of
13	having this information published and placed on uniforms
14	and so forth. And, you know, for whatever reason in the
15	organization, that didn't take place. And, again, while
16	being sensitive to those costs associated with it, it
17	sounds to me from my perspective, at least, that our
18	hands are tied. And with that in mind, I would like to
19	propose a motion that we uphold the decision of the board
20	staff to reject the uniform patch as presented by Tectus
21	Security for the reasons stated in this discussion.
22	MR. BURKE: So what's the board's decision? Do
23	I take the seal off, or do I blacken the seal out? Is
24	that what the problem is, the actual state seal?
25	MS. VINSON: Yes.

MR. KENNEDY: Yes. 1 2 MR. BURKE: The whole state seal? 3 MS. VINSON: Yes. 4 MR. KENNEDY: Just the center part with the 5 seal, eradicate that. The rest of it --6 MR. BURKE: The State of Louisiana, can I just 7 take the pelican down? I'm sorry. 8 Would y'all, like, be interested MR. BLACKBURN: 9 in giving him, say, 90 days to give him time to reorder and all that. 10 11 MR. BURKE: It's not going to be cost effective, 12 I mean, because then I have print work for the Film Fest 13 in October. MR. ROMERO: I'll amend my motion to allow for a 14 15 90-day compliance. 16 MR. ROJAS: I second. 17 MS. VINSON: Any debate/discussion? All in 18 favor. 19 ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Ave. 20 MR. BURKE: Thank you. INSTRUCTOR RESUMÉ OF JEREMY DEWBERRY 21 2.2 MR. ROGILLIO: The next matter is instructor 23 resume of Jeremy Dewberry. Is Mr. Dewberry here? 24 MR. DEWBERRY: Yes, sir. I was instructed to 25 make sure that I bring enough documentation for everybody

1	to review. So I have split them into two sets. There's
2	five, one for each board member that's here. And I have
3	prepared to do the 12 in case the other board members
4	would like a copy or you would like me to leave a copy
5	for them.
6	MR. BLACKBURN: Is this a different set of
7	things than what you passed out?
8	MR. DEWBERRY: That's the same thing, but I knew
9	that they were going to need five, and I didn't know how
10	many you guys would need, so. Do you want me to pass
11	them out or?
12	MR. BLACKBURN: I'll take one more.
13	MR. ROGILLIO: Ms. Vinson, if I could.
14	MS. VINSON: Mr. Rogillio.
15	MR. ROGILLIO: Mr. Dewberry has applied to
16	become an instructor. He has a very impressive history
17	in his law enforcement days. But nowhere in there did I
18	find that he has the three years of supervisory
19	experience, nor did I find, for armed instruction, a seal
20	or a certificate from NRA or P.O.S.T He has P.O.S.T.
21	training, obviously, in Georgia. But those are the
22	topics that we have addressed and asked in him asking
23	to be here.
24	MR. ROMERO: Madam Chairman.
25	MS. VINSON: Yes, sir.

1	MR. ROMERO: Mr. Dewberry.
2	MR. DEWBERRY: Yes, sir.
3	MR. ROMERO: Hearing Mr. Rogillio's summary, can
4	you provide us a short version, in your impression, how
5	you might qualify based on his summary?
6	MR. DEWBERRY: Yes, sir, definitely.
7	MR. ROMERO: Again, there's a lot of information
8	here, but if we don't meet the qualifications, again, our
9	hands are tied.
10	MR. DEWBERRY: I understand. Basically what I
11	can do directed to that is, if you go to the third page
12	of the packet, it starts like this.
13	MS. VINSON: Of the one that's bound?
14	MR. DEWBERRY: Yes. I'm sorry. The one that's
15	bound. A lot of the stuff in there is stuff for you to
16	look at as my body of work to see the instructor
17	experience that I have. And I can walk you through that
18	relatively quickly.
19	For "Has a minimum of three" one of the requirements
20	under 37:3278 I mean 3284 is, "Has a minimum of three
21	years' supervisory experience with contract security
22	company proprietary security organization, or with any
23	federal, state, parochial, municipal, or United States
24	military or law enforcement agency," I've been supervisor
25	for basically what I'm saying is, is that I have a

1 little bit of each of those quali -- you know, the 2 different areas where it says this or this or this. 3 I don't have one complete, but I have a lot of each 4 one. And so I'm asking that the board take into account 5 the level of education, and skill, and training that I 6 have as a combination. And so this is what I am bringing 7 to your attention. (As read by Mr. Dewberry):

8 I have been a supervisor over for a year 9 now at Falcon Security and served honorably and 10 demonstrated my abilities as a supervisor by 11 responding to and addressing operational 12 situations and obstacles with little to no 13 assistance from senior ranking officers. I was 14 responsible for reviewing and approving 15 I have developed and conducted payroll. 16 in-house orientation training to new hires and 17 current employees. I was responsible for 18 "reviewing resumés, conducting pre-employment interviews, and making recommendations to the 19 20 owner of the company in reference to applicant's 21 suitability for hiring. I have received and 2.2 investigated complaints against officers. I 23 have met with clients and served as the liaison 24 between my employer and our client. I have 25 hired individuals. I was responsible for

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1	fingerprinting and processing employee's
2	paperwork as required by the State. I wrote
3	policy and created currently used security
4	protocols. I created and completed employee
5	evaluations, disciplinary forms. I have
6	prepared and issued disciplinary forms,
7	including recommended disciplinary actions. I
8	addressed disciplinary issues and delivered
9	verbal and written disciplinary actions. I
10	created post orders and standard operating
11	procedures and prepared official correspondences
12	from the owner of the company to clients.
13	Supporting documentation that I have to demonstrate
14	that is my Dallas Police Department Academy diploma, my
15	Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officers Standards in
16	Education Training Report, Gwinnett County Police Academy
17	diploma, Georgia P.O.S.T. Training Report, examples of
18	standard operating procedures and policies that I created
19	that are currently in use for a security company in New
20	Orleans, the security protocols that we use and instruct
21	our officers with, an employee evaluation form,
22	counseling forms, an actual counseling that, as a
23	supervisor, I have dealt with.
24	I've prepared letter to clients on behalf of the

25  $\parallel$  owner of the company and also the Falcon Security Company

1	policies and procedures in-service. That in-service is
2	going to be a PowerPoint that's an example of an in-house
3	presentation that I did to educate our employees on being
4	more professional, ethical, and compliant with state laws
5	and our particular policies.
6	MR. BLACKBURN: Can I ask you a question?
7	MR. DEWBERRY: Yes, sir.
8	MR. BLACKBURN: Do you have a police firearms
9	instructor certificate from NRA?
10	MR. DEWBERRY: I do not, but I'm not requested
11	to.
12	MR. BLACKBURN: No? The answer is no?
13	MR. DEWBERRY: Correct, sir.
14	MR. BLACKBURN: Do you have a P.O.S.Tcertified
15	firearms instructor certificate?
16	MR. DEWBERRY: No, sir.
17	MR. BLACKBURN: Do you have a Department of
18	Energy certificate?
19	MR. DEWBERRY: I do not.
20	MR. BLACKBURN: Or a certification by a branch
21	of the United States military?
22	MR. DEWBERRY: I do not.
23	MR. BLACKBURN: Okay. Under the statute, it
24	says you meet all the qualifications of a classroom
25	instructor, including three years, and I give you, you

1	have a wonderful history and all that. But so what we
2	could discuss all day whether or not you meet one, but as
3	you told me, you don't meet two. How do we get past
4	that?
5	MR. DEWBERRY: What you're looking at, sir, are
6	the qualifications to be a firearms instructor. That's
7	not what I'm proposing today. I'm proposing approval for
8	an outside instructor for Louisiana State Board classes,
9	the first and second eight hours.
10	MR. KENNEDY: Classroom only?
11	MR. DEWBERRY: Classroom only.
12	MR. BLACKBURN: Classroom only?
13	MR. DEWBERRY: Yes, sir.
14	MR. BLACKBURN: Okay. I didn't know that.
15	MR. DEWBERRY: I'm sorry. I should have been
16	more clear about that, sir. I apologize.
17	MR. KENNEDY: With No. 6, would he fall okay
18	with No. 6, the teaching certificate?
19	MR. BLACKBURN: Do you have a teacher's
20	certificate?
21	MR. DEWBERRY: That's another matter that I'd
22	like to discuss with you. As far as No. 6, teaching
23	certificate issued by the State of Louisiana Department
24	of Education or the equivalent thereof, and one year
25	supervisory experience as in the security field, I have

1 held a teaching certificate in Georgia that was active 2 while I was employed as a teacher in the public school 3 system that I taught in. I taught for three years in 4 that system.

5 As outlined above in item No. 3, I have been serving 6 as a supervisor for over a year at my current job with a 7 private security company in the New Orleans area. 8 Supporting documentation that's included in your packet, 9 ladies and gentlemen, is the Georgia teacher's 10 certificate, my Georgia paraprofessional teacher's 11 certificate, official memos setting and defining company 12 procedures.

And, basically, I included those so that you can see an example of supervisory activity that I took part in. Those memos are conveniently dated for a one-year period of 6/14, 6 of '14, 6 of '14, July of '14, August of '14, April of 2015, May of 2015, and June of 2015. That's just to demonstrate that meeting that one-year supervisory experience.

I'd like to bring your attention back to No. 4, degree in administration of justice or the equivalent thereof from an accredited college or university. My address to that is, I have a bachelor's in general studies in social science that includes Introduction to Business, Introduction to Teaching, Instructional

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Technology, Professional Speaking, Measurements in 1 2 That's regarding testing, assessments, and Education. 3 modifying testing to improve course outlines. The 9 college that I went to with Louisiana Technical 10 University did not have a criminal justice program. So I 11 knew I wanted to go to that college for other reasons, 12 and I basically tailored the degree to achieve my future 13 So I did quite a bit of planning from an early qoals. 14 age to try to put myself in the position to one day be 15 before you asking for the privilege of being an 16 instructor. 17 Mr. Blackburn. MR. KENNEDY: 18 MR. BLACKBURN: Yes, sir. 19 MR. KENNEDY: Again, would a teaching 20 certificate from the State of Georgia that he held for 21 three years, along with his one year of experience, would 2.2 that qualify him under No. 6 with the equivalent thereof?

23 MR. BLACKBURN: It may well. And if the 24 certificate is equivalent to the Louisiana certificate, 25 it may well, yes.

7	MR. ROMERO: My preference, although I don't
8	disagree with you, I would agree, if we can do it, maybe
9	more curriculum specific rather than a time frame
10	specific in the training, kind of like we have done with
11	the other training.
12	MS. VINSON: I would be fine with that.
13	MR. ROMERO: And if we maybe put something in
14	place to extend out the time for one, rather than a
15	renewal, maybe extend it further out, that within so many
16	years. You know, we can agree and vote on that.
17	MS. VINSON: I'm open to anything, like, just to
18	try and get something there. I'd like us to maybe have a
19	conversation at our next meeting, like, maybe have a
20	committee meeting.
21	MS. AUCOIN: Just because, at some point as we
22	get closer to the next meeting, we're going to have to
23	start, like, grabbing legislators. It's an unlimited
24	session, I think, but maybe if, beforehand, if y'all have
