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TRANSCRIPT OF PROCEEDINGS 1 2 MR. GURVICH: Welcome, everyone, to the 3 quarterly meeting of the Louisiana State Board of Private 4 Security Examiners. I will ask our counsel Frank 5 Blackburn to lead us in The Pledge followed by a brief 6 moment of silence. 7 (Pledge of Allegiance and brief moment of silence.) 8 MR. GURVICH: Thank you. May we have a roll 9 call, please. (Roll call.) 10 11 MR. GURVICH: All right. There being a quorum 12 present, let's proceed. What's your pleasure? Do I hear 13 a motion to waive the reading of the minutes? 14 MR. ROMERO: So moved. 15 MR. KENNEDY: Second. 16 MR. GURVICH: Motion by Romero. Second by 17 Mr. Kennedy. All in favor of the motion as stated say 18 aye. 19 ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 2.0 Any opposed? The motion passes MR. GURVICH: 2.1 unanimously. Next matter. Do we have hearings today, 2.2. Counsel? 2.3 WARDRICK HOWARD 24 MS. AUCOIN: Sir, we had one hearing, 25 Mr. Wardrick Howard, who is. I spoke to him beforehand,

and the appeal is, he appealed the denial of a license 2 and he actually was issued a license subsequent to the 3 original denial. So he has now obtained his license as 4 an unarmed guard, and that satisfies his appeal. 5 Is that correct? 6 MR. HOWARD: Yes. 7 MR. GURVICH: So the effect of all this, I take 8 it, then, is the appeal has been withdrawn? 9 MS. AUCOIN: Yes. Moot, withdrawn. 10 MR. GURVICH: Okay. Is this one of those 11 federal firearm things? 12 MS. AUCOIN: No. He was appealing the denial of 13 the permit -- I mean, I'm sorry, the license. And he in fact was issued a license. There was some confusion over 14 15 the paperwork, so. 16 MR. GURVICH: Okay. Since everything is handled 17 in that regard, I will assume that it is. Then we will 18 proceed to the next matter. 19 Thank you for being here today. 2.0 MR. HOWARD: Thank you. 21 The next matter being? MR. GURVICH: 2.2. LEGAL UPDATE/LEGISLATION 2.3 MS. RYLAND: Legislative Update. 24 MR. GURVICH: Okay. 25 MR. BLACKBURN: We have none. Nobody has

1	presented us any legislation to go. We are
2	MR. GURVICH: They're in special session.
3	MR. BLACKBURN: They're in special session for,
4	what, nine more days
5	MR. GURVICH: Fiscal only.
6	MR. BLACKBURN: Right. But the regular is
7	starting
8	MS. VINSON: April?
9	MS. AUCOIN: March.
10	MS. VINSON:
11	MR. BLACKBURN: Yes. And if you come up with
12	something quickly, you know, we will get it in. But
13	right now we don't have anything.
14	MR. GURVICH: Any proposed legislation for
15	counsel to present to the legislature?
16	MS. VINSON: None from me.
17	MR. KENNEDY: None from me.
18	MR. GURVICH: Okay. Anything further on the
19	legislative side?
20	MR. BLACKBURN: No, sir. It's not going to
21	surprise me they have looked at every fund. They are
22	looking for money. It's not going to surprise me they
23	will try and take that fund we've got, but as far as I
24	know it hasn't risen its head yet.
25	MR. GURVICH: Well, it is what it is. I'm sure

they are going to be looking everywhere. Now, at some 2 point, you need some retained, returned earnings, or 3 whatever it is you call our surplus --4 MS. VINSON: Operating capital. 5 MR. GURVICH: -- to operate. Yes. Or you'll 6 just going to, one day, you will have to be going to them 7 for money and they won't give it to you. And at that 8 point, the board can't make payroll. So take it for what 9 it's worth, but, I mean. MR. BLACKBURN: We would never call it surplus. 10 11 We just -- it's operating money if they want to take some 12 of it. 13 MR. GURVICH: Right. MS. RYLAND: Well, the money that's set aside is 14 15 actually for retirement, so do you think they can touch 16 that? 17 No. But you also need a certain MR. GURVICH: 18 amount of cash to -- you know, you might have a downturn in receipts, or anything can happen. 19 MS. RYLAND: We have plenty there to run the 2.0 21 That's no problem. But I'm just worried about business. the money that we have set aside for our retirees. 2.2 2.3 MR. GURVICH: No. I don't think that is 24 subject --25 MR. BLACKBURN: What is it that -- the retirees?

Say that again.

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MS. RYLAND: It's the money that we set aside every year that is for the people that's retired, for the thing that we are supposed to pay. I mean, I know we don't pay the retirement, but we have insurance, stuff like that, that comes out of that, that the legislative auditor makes us set aside. So do you think they can?

MR. BLACKBURN: No.

MS. RYLAND: If they can't do that, then there is no money for them to touch, because, basically, it's nonprofit and there's not a whole lot of extra. I mean, if something were to happen, we would have to put in a new air conditioning or fix something.

MR. BLACKBURN: That's my point.

MS. RYLAND: Right. As long as they can't touch that money.

MR. BLACKBURN: They can do whatever they want.

MS. RYLAND: Right.

MR. GURVICH: Right.

MS. RYLAND: But, I mean, it's designated, so.

MR. GURVICH: It's designated. It would be hard to take that. But that being said, they could send auditors over and try and rake some of our -- what is the proper term, when you are not a business per se, of having a surplus of cash until? I don't know what you

would call that. But I know what it's called in business. I don't know what it's called for a state agency. But, yes. Some argument could be made that some of that could be taken for the general fund, but I don't think — not out of retirement, no.

MR. BLACKBURN: How much money is in that account?

MS. RYLAND: Around \$400,000.

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MR. GURVICH: Well, okay. Let's move on. Office Status Reports.

MR. BLACKBURN: Well, one more thing.

MS. RYLAND: I'm sorry. It's 600,000.

MS. AUCOIN: There is some legislation pending during the regular session that will come up regarding concealed carry permits. There is a number of bills out there. There could be a constitutional right to carry, there could just be some amendments to the current concealed carry permit laws that may have an effect on the board which determines whether or not we can arm certain individuals or not in conjunction with the ATF's position as to what our most restrictive gun law is. So as that develops, we will certainly keep y'all updated. But it is something that can certainly affect the way we conduct business.

MR. GURVICH: Questions/comments for counsel?

Does the board have a position on the carrying of 1 2 concealed weapons by a uniformed security officers on 3 post on duty? Do we have an official position on that? 4 MR. BLACKBURN: As long as they are armed --5 have a license to be armed. 6 MR. GURVICH: Right. Well, they would have to 7 obtain an armed license from us, for sure, that, I 8 understand, but not a concealed carry permit as well. Do 9 we say that the weapon has to be visible, has to be 10 displayed? 11 MR. BLACKBURN: I don't know of any place that 12 says that. 13 MR. GURVICH: I don't either. That's not a section of the statutes that I have to read a whole lot. 14 15 I'm just interested and I throw that out there. 16 I think, in the past, it's been MR. KENNEDY: 17 we've had to submit a letter to the board to the 18 executive secretary stating that this individual has a 19 security officer armed license, that he has a concealed 2.0 carry permit issued by the State of Louisiana. And then 2.1 we have to define where this individual will be working. 2.2 MR. GURVICH: See, Mr. Kennedy is in charge of 2.3 the board's collective memory. 24 MS. RYLAND: If it's determined that they have 25 an armed license and they have to carry a concealed

permit for some reason or they have to carry their weapon 2 concealed, they have to have a concealed carry permit. 3 MR. GURVICH: Right. 4 They can't just -- but, normally, MS. RYLAND: if they were to -- if somebody in the industry were to 5 6 ask us, we would tell them no, just to have an armed 7 license, you have to -- but the gun has to be visible. 8 MR. GURVICH: Right. 9 MS. RYLAND: You know, we always tell them if 10 you're -- there are companies that do have guns that are 11 not visible that are required to have concealed carry. 12 MR. GURVICH: Right. But in other words, as I understand it, then, if for some reason a armed -- well, 13 14 an armed, otherwise, armed uniformed security officer or 15 his company felt the need to carry a concealed weapon, he 16 would apply to the secretary with a letter stating the 17 reason therefore. 18 MR. BLACKBURN: Right. 19 MR. GURVICH: And then it would be granted or 20 not as the situation warranted. So that's the current 2.1 state of affairs. 2.2. MR. ROMERO: Is it just notification, or is it 2.3 approval? I don't know how we can restrict. 24 Notification. MR. BLACKBURN:

MR. KENNEDY: Notification is what I was told.

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1	MR. GURVICH: Okay.
2	MR. KENNEDY: Because I inquired about it once
3	in the past.
4	MR. GURVICH: But you are right. It may be a
5	constitutional law issue pretty soon. I don't know. I
6	think that right now we would expect a letter stating the
7	reason
8	MR. BLACKBURN: And at one time, I know there
9	was a bunch of them that were wearing suit coats or
10	sportcoats.
11	MR. GURVICH: We do have that. We do have
12	MS. RYLAND: You have to be approved to wear
13	plain clothes.
14	MR. GURVICH: Well, it's not they could be
15	in
16	MR. BLACKBURN: Some of them are marked.
17	MR. GURVICH: a uniform wearing a jacket.
18	MS. RYLAND: But you have to have the uniform
19	approved.
20	MR. GURVICH: Where the uniform has to be
21	approved and everything, and it can be concealed beneath
22	their blazer even though it was like plain clothes.
23	MS. RYLAND: But they have to carry a concealed
24	weapon.
25	MR. GURVICH: It could be plain clothes, or it

could be a uniform. And so if it's marked accordingly, that's perfectly okay. But in either event, you need to get the letter per -- I think we did address this many years ago. So that's the situation.

OLD BUSINESS, OFFICE STATUS REPORTS

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MR. GURVICH: Status reports, Office Status
Reports do we have those distributed? Is that what's up
here? Our board members may want to take a quick look.

In terms of the board status reports and moneys, is there anything trending and unusual with the guards or anything out of whack with what we would see in the normal projections budget-wise and office-wise, or is it pretty much all in line?

MS. RYLAND: Everything is fine.

MR. GURVICH: Any questions, board members, for our office status reports, financial reports? If none, then we will move on to New Business.

NEW BUSINESS, MISCELLANEOUS, DISCUSSION OF INTERVIEWS

MR. GURVICH: Do we have anything in New Business, besides the recommendations of our committee? Have we arrived at a point which we should be going into executive session?

MS. RYLAND: I'm sorry?

MR. GURVICH: Have we arrived at the point where we need to go into executive session? I'm throwing the

1	floor open.
2	MS. VINSON: I make a recommendation that we go
3	into executive session to discuss the committee meeting
4	yesterday.
5	MR. GURVICH: Okay. Well, we will regard that
6	as a motion and that I will second it and it requires a
7	two-thirds majority.
8	MS. RYLAND: Wait. That wasn't called a
9	committee meeting.
10	MS. VINSON: Oh, it was not. We discussed our
11	interviews.
12	MR. GURVICH: I thought it was a committee
13	meeting.
14	MS. VINSON: No, it wasn't.
15	MR. GURVICH: Well, it's something we will
16	certainly want to look at.
17	MS. VINSON: I make a motion that we go into
18	executive session to discuss the interviews that were
19	conducted yesterday.
20	MR. GURVICH: For the position of?
21	MS. VINSON: For the position of executive
22	secretary.
23	QUESTIONS/COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC
24	MR. GURVICH: So seconded. Now, before we do
25	that, may I make one suggestion. There are folks here

who have presented themselves to the board for whatever reason. If going a little bit out of turn, if you have any questions for the public or which to address the board in any wise, you might wish to do so now, because we're getting ready to go into executive session, so we're going to have to ask that everyone who is not a board member or staff or counsel leave the room. But we are very appreciative of your being here, and if there is some whys or wherefores that you would like to address the board, I would take this out of order so that you don't have to wait upon us when we come back into general session. Any questions or?

MS. PIERRE: I do.

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MR. GURVICH: Yes, ma'am. Why don't you come forward. I think we all know who you are, but for the sake of the record, find an open mic, introduce yourself and --

MS. PIERRE: Okay. My name is Marian Pierre, Crescent Guard and Security Company in New Orleans, Louisiana. So I have a couple questions for the board members, one being is that I understand we are in the process of selecting a new secretary for the board.

MR. GURVICH: Correct.

MS. PIERRE: And I also understand that there are several positions still vacant on the board. I would

just ask in the wisdom of this board that they delay the appointment of a new secretary and have an interim until the board is fully staffed or the board is full, all the appointments have been made to this board. I would just ask that.

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And, secondly, the other thing that I have is that I have had a -- we have a employee that has had something before this board for several months. They have not been notified about a hearing date. They are still waiting on some correspondence from you guys as it relates to their status with their license. I think they were here with their attorney several weeks -- several months ago, and they were told that they would get a notice from this board or from the secretary as to when the hearing would be set. So, again, they have not heard anything.

My third thing to the board is that we are having serious problems in New Orleans as it relates to, time and time again, guards applying for jobs working for other companies, that they have worked several months, some a year without any training, temporary cards being issued over and over, no hard cards ever being given.

They are not aware that they are in violation, but when they apply for jobs, we are aware that they are in violation, that they have been working without a license. And when we call the state board that has no license has

1	been applied for, for that person. And so I would ask
2	that we do a better job of policing the companies, the
3	small companies that we are approving, and making sure
4	that they are following the same rules as we have to.
5	That was my three things. And I thank you for your
6	consideration.
7	MR. GURVICH: Sure. By the way, we do have an
8	interim secretary. That is Ms. Ryland.
9	MS. RYLAND: No, I'm not interim.
10	MR. GURVICH: Well, you are the functional
11	person in charge.
12	MS. RYLAND: Right, but I was not interim
13	executive secretary.
14	MR. GURVICH: Right. So it's a question of
15	semantics, but she is in charge of the office, just so
16	you know, for the time being.
17	As to your question about the new executive
18	secretary, I can't answer that as an individual, because
19	the board has to deal with that.
20	What was the second question?
21	MS. VINSON: It was about the employee that
22	MS. RYLAND: We will find out about him and put
23	it on the next.
24	MR. GURVICH: Do y'all all know of whom we
25	speak?

1	MS. PIERRE: Yes. I can tell you his name if
2	you don't have it.
3	MS. VINSON: I think
4	MR. BLACKBURN: We have it.
5	MS. PIERRE: His name is Walter Stembridge.
6	MS. RYLAND: We are going to try to have a board
7	meeting in April, so we'll notify him.
8	MS. VINSON: Is there information that we have
9	that could help her?
10	MS. RYLAND: No. I don't have anything.
11	MS. PIERRE: You are asking me for the
12	information?
13	MS. VINSON: No. I'm asking counsel or Jane if
14	they have information on this individual that might help
15	you.
16	MS. PIERRE: Their attorneys, the attorneys were
17	here at the last time they met before the board. The
18	attorney was here and presented the information. And I
19	think he had a conversation with the legal your
20	attorney and with your secretary about the issues that
21	were before you.
22	MR. GURVICH: Was that something that we did
23	address or that we decided not to address?
24	MS. AUCOIN: If I recall correctly, I think the
25	 issue was either he was not given an armed status or his

armed status was revoked due to the ATF interpretation of who can and cannot possess a firearm, if I recall, because the attorney -- you know, this is kind of something new -- can give him more time to prepare and there is notice --

MR. GURVICH: This gets back to that ATF federal firearms issue?

MS. PIERRE: Yes.

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MS. AUCOIN: Yes.

MR. GURVICH: Okay. And so they did address it in a preliminary way, just so you know. This is an extremely -- and I don't agree with what the federal government has done with this thing, I want to say. I think it's just dead wrong.

This is a case that potentially, at least, involves multiple federal and perhaps state statutes and, in one regard, at least, could even have constitutional issues. I am dead set against the federal interpretation, and the people who have lost their right to carry a firearm in the course and scope of their duty. I think it's crazy. It's a violation of due process, among other things. But we have absolutely no control over that.

MS. PIERRE: I understand that. But just for your information, this person received a full pardon. So in my understanding of a full pardon, it means just that:

1	It is a full pardon. You have people that have licensed
2	as bails bondsmen and what have you. With a full pardon,
3	they are able to get those licenses.
4	MS. RYLAND: With a governor's pardon or a
5	presidential pardon?
6	MS. PIERRE: I think it is a governor's pardon.
7	MS. RYLAND: If he will send me a copy of that,
8	we can clear him on that. But I don't have a copy.
9	MS. PIERRE: I think the attorney left that
10	here. I think they left that here.
11	MS. AUCOIN: No. I don't believe we I don't
12	think we got that far.
13	MS. PIERRE: Well, I thought he sent that in.
14	But I'll just make sure that they do, because the
15	attorney has
16	MS. AUCOIN: Yes.
17	MS. RYLAND: Because I can clear it on a
18	governor's pardon.
19	MS. PIERRE: It's a governor's pardon.
20	MS. RYLAND: Well, if I get it, I can clear it.
21	That will be the end of that.
22	MR. GURVICH: So the board has addressed it, but
23	it needs to be finalized and whatever. Maybe there is
24	some paperwork or documentation still out there .
25	MS. VINSON: They had left. That way, they

could get more stuff in order, and they were going to 2 come back again and --3 MS. AUCOIN: The hearing was going to be reset 4 to another date, the next date. And, I mean, I don't 5 recall that part of it, but I do recall the particular 6 So, I mean, if you've got the governor's pardon, 7 get them to send that to Jane, and it will more than 8 likely be very easily resolved. 9 MR. GURVICH: That can be resolved between board 10 meetings. You don't need us for that. 11 MS. RYLAND: If I can get it today, I will do 12 it. 13 MS. PIERRE: They just said that they would set 14 it up for a board meeting. 15 MR. GURVICH: It's been addressed, and we will 16 continue to address it. 17 Now, on the subject of the hard cards versus the 18 temp cards, your temp card is good for an extended period 19 of whatever, however long it takes you to get your hard 2.0 card. So you have license. But in terms of the latency 21 for getting the card, I mean, I'll let you guys. 2.2. MR. VINSON: Right. I think she's saying they 2.3 are not getting the card because there is no training 24 being submitted to the board. 25 MS. PIERRE: That is correct. There is nothing

being submitted to the board. We understand that cards take a while and that you can use a temporary card. There is no question there. The question is that the fact of nothing has ever been sent up for that person, and they have been working a year or more with some of the companies.

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MS. VINSON: Okay. When you come across those people, I think you need to recommend that they contact the board and say this is who I worked for and send something in writing to the board: I got this card. I have been employed with them for X-length of time, and, you know, I have never been trained. Because that -- I mean, that initiates us to look into it.

MS. PIERRE: Well, I think it's an industry problem, and I think it makes our industry look bad. But I think the fact that we have investigators, and when we bring this to the board, those investigators should go out and check those companies, and I don't think that that is happening on a regular basis, or somebody being assigned to that area to make sure that that's happening, that everybody is in compliance.

MS. RYLAND: When Wayne left, he handed me a stack of reports. And so I do have one investigator on three different companies right now looking into some stuff.

One company is not licensed or has not applied for a license. The other two, one has a license not doing what they are supposed to do, and the other one has a license in the works.

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So I'm trying to touch on them, but I only have one investigator. And, you know, I have another job, other than just complaints. So I'm trying but. There were numerous of complaints that I had to pick up.

MS. PIERRE: Maybe that's something we need to look at as a board, how we hire, how many investigators do we need, do we need to divide the state up and have more investigators or whatever it takes to protect our industry, because it gives us, again, a bad reputation in the industry of not providing people who are properly trained and meet the requirements. And we don't know that until something happens or until one of those people come before us.

So I would just ask the board in their wisdom that we would look at maybe policing the industry a little bit better, hiring more people to do so.

MR. GURVICH: I agree. Sometimes it's hard to get these investigators. We tried, and I think we had one authorized, but I think I would like to go back to the part-time system where we can get guys to work in various areas of the state. We are looking at that as we

1	speak in terms of stepping up the number of field
2	investigations that our guys conduct. That is being
3	looked at as we speak.
4	MS. PIERRE: Okay? Well, thank you very much.
5	MR. GURVICH: Thank you for being here.
6	MS. PIERRE: And I will wait to hear what
7	happens.
8	MR. GURVICH: Thank you. Would anyone else like
9	to address the board before we hear a motion to go into
10	executive session?
11	NEW BUSINESS, MISCELLANEOUS, DISCUSSION OF INTERVIEWS
12	(CONT'D)
13	MR. GURVICH: All right. I call for a motion.
14	All in favor of going into executive session say aye.
15	ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
16	MR. GURVICH: Any opposed? The motion passes
17	unanimously. I would ask that all of our spectators and
18	folks not involved with staff or counsel or board
19	members, if you would be so kind as to depart the room
20	until we come back into regular session. We very much
21	appreciate it. Thank you for being here today.
22	MS. PIERRE: Excuse me, Louis. Did you say that
23	you all were going to consider what I just asked, that we
24	postpone appointing someone?

MR. GURVICH: Going to consider it right now in

1	executive session.
2	MS. PIERRE: Good. Thank you very much.
3	(Executive session.)
4	(General meeting resumes.)
5	MR. GURVICH: Okay. Now we are back in the
6	general meeting. Anybody who wants to come back in the
7	general meeting can if there are folks who are still out
8	there.
9	MS. VINSON: Are there?
10	MR. GURVICH: All right. We are out of
11	executive session. I apologize to the audience for the
12	inconvenience.
13	I will now make a motion thanking the nine committee
14	members who worked so hard on this for their service and
15	authorizing the board chairman to make the offers to the
16	individuals discussed in the meeting in the order in
17	which they were discussed in the meeting. Do I hear a
18	second to my motion?
19	MR. ROMERO: Second.
20	MR. KENNEDY: Second.
21	MS. VINSON: Second.
22	MR. GURVICH: Okay. Motion to by Mr. Gurvich
23	jointly seconded by Mr. Romero, Ms. Vinson, and I believe
24	Mr. Kennedy over there. And I might as well make it a
25	unanimous. Jointly seconded by the unanimous present

26 board members. All in favor of the motion as stated say 2 aye. 3 ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 4 MR. GURVICH: All right. The motion passes 5 unanimously. 6 Next matter. We are just back in general session. 7 I have lost the agenda. It's in here somewhere. 8 going on? We did Questions From the Public. 9 Determination of the Next Board Meeting. (Ms. Vinson confers with Mr. Gurvich.) 10 11 MR. GURVICH: Oh, yes, sure. Go ahead and do 12 so. 13 MS. VINSON: Ms. Pierre, it came up, we did 14 discuss and address your concerns. We decided 15

MS. VINSON: Ms. Pierre, it came up, we did discuss and address your concerns. We decided unanimously to move ahead with our decision or move ahead with the appointment of the executive secretary or make an offer for one strictly based on — you know, we don't necessarily know if and when a new board would be appointed, you know, the time frame for that, how long that would take.

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And in conjunction with that, that also leaves us outstanding with the hiring of a full-time investigator. Right now we are using part-time investigators, which we are fine doing, because we are just calling them in and they are busy, but it kind of ties the hands of the staff

and the board by not having that position in place. 1 2 So we decided to move along with the process to go 3 ahead and place that person. 4 Okay. So will we at least be able MS. PIERRE: 5 to see or find information about the person that you 6 appointed, what their background is, if they have any 7 administrative experience or anything like that? be able to review that or see that somewhere? 8 9 MS. VINSON: Because of --10 MS. PIERRE: Once you have made the offer, then 11 that person accepts it, then it becomes public? 12 MS. VINSON: It does become public, yes. 13 MR. GURVICH: Right. But right now it hasn't been made public. But, in short, it soon will be. 14 15 Well, I would be interested to see MS.
