15 All those here are yeses to

16 return to open session.

17 All right. Mr. Hallack, do

18 you want to kind of present to the open

19 session what's going on here?

20 MR. HALLACK:

21 Yes, sir.

22 On your agenda is a matter

23 called Louisiana Used Motor Vehicle

24 Commission versus Curtis Hodgson and Legacy

25 Housing, Limited. This is a matter that was

1 brought to the Commission's attention by
2 several disgruntled RV dealers that a group
3 of gentlemen were selling FEMA trailers out
4 of the Melville area.

5 Based on our investigation
6 and some complaints that were filed by other
7 retail dealers, we learned that there were
8 some trailers sold from the State of
9 Louisiana without a license. Pursuant to
10 that investigation and several phases of
11 discovery that we've been through with
12 Legacy Housing, we've reached an agreement
13 as to a resolution of this case and that
14 resolution is before you in an order of
15 dismissal.

16 In the order of dismissal,
17 you'll see that the Commission has decided
18 to resolve this case and release from any
19 further liability with this Commission three
20 individuals, Curtis Hodgson, Brian Ledbetter
21 and a gentleman, I can't remember his first
22 name, Hendrix, and they are the principals
23 of a business called Legacy Housing,
24 Limited. So we are releasing those three
25 individuals and Legacy Housing, Limited, as

1 well as Legacy Housing, LLC, from any
2 further liability to this Commission in
3 payment of \$90,000, which as I understand
4 will occur within 15 days from the day that
5 the order is signed.

6 Also, we had some complaints
7 from retail dealers that they had not
8 received titles. Those retail dealers have
9 either been satisfied or they have
10 acknowledged that there is a dispute as to
11 what was paid for, how much of it is still
12 left owing and that those disputes will be
13 resolved in a court of civil jurisdiction.
14 And it's also our understanding that in
15 addition to the dismissal that you have
16 there, that they will include with it that
17 they will work with any retail consumer who
18 is having problems getting a title and will
19 work directly with the retail consumer on
20 any title issues.

21 Are there any questions?

22 (No response.)

23 MR. HALLACK:

24 If not, we would like a
25 motion to adopt the order of dismissal,

1 which is in front of you.

2 MS. MORRIS:

3 The order of dismissal
4 contemplates that all costs have been paid.
5 Actually, the Commission, I would recommend,
6 approve the dismissal upon receipt of the
7 funds, which we do not have today.

8 MR. DOMINGUE:

9 We have no objection with
10 that process. We can make upon an order --
11 excuse me, upon an approved motion that it
12 will be accepted upon delivery of the funds.
13 We would then pay within 15 days of that
14 approved motion.

15 MS. MORRIS:

16 Or what the Commission would
17 do would authorize Mr. Parnell to sign the
18 order after confirmation of the funds.

19 MR. DOMINGUE:

20 We have no objection to that.

21 MR. POTEET:

22 All right. We need a motion
23 to that effect.

24 MR. TAYLOR:

25 I would make a motion that we

1 accept the order of dismissal upon getting
2 the money, receiving the funds.

3 MR. TURNER:

4 Second.

5 MR. POTEET:

6 I have a second.

7 All in favor, say "Aye."

8 (All "Aye" responses.)

9 MR. POTEET:

10 All right. That takes care
11 of that.

12 Thank you, Mr. Domingue, for
13 coming in.

14 MR. DOMINGUE:

15 Thank you very much and thank
16 you for the courtesy of taking me early.
17 I'm sure Judge Donald Hebert in Opelousas is
18 going to be very happy.

19 MR. POTEET:

20 Send him our best.

21 Do we have anybody for public
22 comments?

23 (No response.)

24 MR. POTEET:

25 Items for discussion, we have

1 approval of minutes from the previous
2 meeting. We need a motion. Anyone?

3 MR. ROY:

4 I'll make the motion.

5 MR. POTEET:

6 Kirby Roy.

7 MR. SMITH:

8 Second.

9 MR. POTEET:

10 Second.

11 All in favor, say "Aye."

12 (All "Aye" responses.)

13 MR. POTEET:

14 All right. So approval of
15 the minutes from the previous meeting.

16 Financial matters, Mona.

17 MS. ANDERSON:

18 Good morning. If you'll turn

19 in your packets to the financial statement

20 for the month ending April 30th, on Page 1

21 of your statement is your balance sheet.

22 The operating account, you can see there as

23 of April 30th, our balance was \$1,144,955.

24 That included the deferred revenue, which

25 we're going to talk about on the next page

1 of \$238,000. Under the accounts receivable,
2 hearings and fines line of the balance
3 sheet, that decrease to \$67,000 is due to
4 the collection of some fines. On line 2 of
5 the liability section of your balance sheet,
6 is \$18,000 and that's due primarily to we
7 received an invoice -- a maintenance invoice
8 on the CAVU licensing system and it was
9 received in April, and we will remit that in
10 May. So it was recorded in April. On Page
11 2, the year-to-date deferred revenue again
12 is \$238,170. And down at the bottom, the
13 year-to-date revenue over expenditures was
14 \$324,804.

15 On the next page under your
16 revenue and expenditure statement, our
17 revenue, of course, at the end of the year
18 -- fiscal year is dropping. Our
19 month-to-date revenue was \$15,472. That's
20 due partially to a refund that we did to a
21 parts dealer of \$22,000. However, you'll
22 see that the year-to-date revenues were
23 \$1,061,000 compared to \$986,000 last year at
24 the same time, about a \$75,000 increase
25 there.

1 If you turn to the next page,
2 on Page 4, the expenditures were slightly
3 higher this month. We had a couple of
4 items. We discussed before the CAVU
5 licensing program. We got the invoice for
6 that. That was \$17,600. And the legal
7 invoices, we had carried over some invoices
8 from last month and paid in April. So you
9 had two months' worth of legal invoices
10 there that made that line item a little
11 higher.

12 So the expenditures -- on the
13 last page of the expenditures, Page 6, the
14 expenses at the end of the this month should
15 have been -- what was remaining in the
16 budget should have been about 17 percent and
17 we have about 28 percent remaining in the
18 budget. So we're in good shape there. The
19 month-to-date revenue over expenditures was
20 a \$76,000 loss and this was higher than the
21 same month last year mostly due to those
22 invoices that we had in this month.
23 However, the year-to-date gain was \$324,804
24 compared to \$220,492 for the same period
25 last year. And if you turn the page, the

1 following statement of your revenue over
2 expenditures, it's shown again as \$324,804.

3 On Page 8, the certificates
4 of deposit summary is -- you've got a couple
5 of new items there. The Landmark
6 certificates renewed on an annual basis at
7 point eight-zero percent interest. So those
8 renewed to mature in 2013.

9 On Page 9 of the financial
10 statements, the accounts receivable hearings
11 and fines, you'll see the balance we spoke
12 about earlier, \$67,000, and we collected
13 \$1,750. Of that, we collected \$800 from
14 Extreme Cars, \$650 from Gum Ridge Auto and
15 \$300 from Boardwalk Motors. And just a
16 reminder for next month, we're going to need
17 to be doing the budget amendments to bring
18 the budget in line for the end of the year.
19 So it's really important that we have a
20 quorum at next month's meeting.

21 So unless there are any other
22 questions, that concludes my report.

23 MR. POTEET:

24 Any questions on the
25 financial report?

1 (No response.)

2 MR. POTEET:

3 Thank you, Mona.

4 Any comments?

5 (No response.)

6 MR. POTEET:

7 We need a motion to approve

8 the financial report.

9 MR. SMITH:

10 I make motion to approve it.

11 MR. TAYLOR:

12 Second.

13 MR. POTEET:

14 All in favor, say "Aye."

15 (All "Aye" responses.)

16 MR. POTEET:

17 So we've approved the April

18 financial report.

19 The next item on the agenda

20 -- we've already done the legal matters and

21 pending litigation. So next is the 2012

22 regular legislative session.

23 Mr. Parnell, are you going

24 guide us through that?

25 MR. PARNELL:

1 Yes, as best as I can. I'll
2 ask Ms. Morris.

3 MR. TURNER:

4 Excuse me, y'all, I've got to
5 leave. I've got a problem back at my
6 dealership. So I've got to go.

7 MR. POTEET:

8 We still have a quorum.

9 MR. PARNELL:

10 The first item on the bill --
11 on the agenda was House Bill 804 by
12 Representative James. That was our bill
13 that we put forth as a technical amendment.
14 The bill has been signed by the Governor's
15 Office and it is now Act 136. It has now
16 moved into law at the point until -- it's
17 July 1 -- August.

18 MR. POTEET:

19 August 1.

20 MR. PARNELL:

21 At that point, what I'll do
22 is put it down on the agenda -- I mean, on
23 the website, so everyone -- dealers, and
24 we're going try to start put out e-mails, so
25 everyone can see what laws have changed for

1 us in particular.

2 House Bill 442 by
3 Representative Abramson, this was the bill
4 that was being pushed by SEADRA in reference
5 to the rent-to-own. And speaking with
6 Representative Billiot when we were down at
7 the Capitol on -- week before last,
8 Representative Abramson had agreed with him
9 to withdraw that bill altogether, 442, and
10 just -- they were just going to look at 1074
11 and if they needed to make any amendments to
12 1074, they were going to do that at that
13 time. Senate Bill 590 by Senator Alario,
14 this IS a bill -- the way it's written is
15 that they wanted to get all funds that were
16 special funds and move them out of the
17 treasury, but our language -- I know Sheri
18 had been kind of dealing with that with me.
19 So if you will, Sheri, if you can go through
20 that.

21 MS. MORRIS: .

22 I think the reason that our
23 fund was included in there is because the
24 Treasurer's Office set up a special fund
25 within their account, the account that they

1 maintain, called the Louisiana Used Motor
2 Vehicle Commission Fund, even though the
3 statute didn't say that that fund was in the
4 treasury.

5 The Louisiana Used Vehicle
6 Commission Fund is actually our operating
7 account fund that we maintain. So if they
8 take -- the proposal is to take that
9 language out to enable the Treasurer's
10 Office to close the account. I think I've
11 talked to a number of people and they're
12 convinced that they can close that account
13 without changing the language in the
14 statute. However, the Division of
15 Administration didn't want to take all of
16 the language out of that bill. So they
17 asked us to come up with an amendment to the
18 language.

19 So the amendment that I
20 drafted and sent to the Representative from
21 the Division is -- would make our language
22 identical to what the New Car Commission
23 has, which is not substantively different
24 from what we have now, but it solves their
25 problem if they want something in the bill

1 deal with it. So the last correspondence I
2 got from them on Friday, the bill is now on
3 the Senate floor, was that they had sent the
4 amendment to the staff, they didn't have a
5 problem with the staff, and if there was a
6 problem, they would notify me, and I haven't
7 received any notice. I think that was
8 Thursday that I got that message. So if it
9 does come out of Senate without the
10 amendment, they will have to address it in
11 the House Committee next week, but hopefully
12 they will have that amendment when it goes
13 to the House.

14 MR. POTEET:

15 So it sounds like just kind
16 of a technicality.

17 MS. MORRIS:

18 It is. There were some
19 statutes that had -- the language you have
20 is the same as most licensing commissions
21 have, but there were some that said in the
22 Treasury -- in the State Treasury after the
23 special fund. Yours was not one of those.

24 One of my other clients, the
25 Cosmetology Board, was one of those. And

1 several years ago, the Treasurer's Office
2 ask them to have that language removed,
3 because they did not want to maintain that
4 account or audit that account. So I don't
5 know why this one got -- this one got picked
6 up because, for some reason, there was an
7 account set up in the Treasury. They have
8 said that no money has gone into it and no
9 money has come out of it, and that's why
10 they want to close it off of their books.
11 My position was, you don't need to alter our
12 statute to do that. And I think that
13 they're in agreement with that now, but
14 because of it being in the bill, everybody
15 wanted some language to address our fund.
16 So I just made it identical to the New Car
17 Commission, because I felt like our fund was
18 most similar to that and hopefully that will
19 work.

20 MR. POTEET:

21 We'll know if there are any
22 issues with that by the end of this week?

23 MS. MORRIS:

24 Yes, because it should come
25 up on the floor today at some point.

1 MR. PARNELL:

2 House Bill 1002 by
3 Representative Jones, that was the bill that
4 kind of dealt with abolishing the Used Car
5 Commission in its entirety. That bill
6 hasn't done anything. I spoke with some
7 other reps and they did address it and ask
8 Representative Jones if he's going to do
9 something with it and he told several of
10 them that he's not going to move with the
11 bill at all. I think right now we've got
12 about three weeks left in the session.

13 MS. MORRIS:

14 I spoke with the Chairman of
15 the House Commerce Committee about that on
16 Friday and he said that there would be no
17 House Bills heard in commerce any longer.
18 So Representative Billiot's bill was heard
19 in commerce last week by special commission
20 as the deadlines are here. The bills in
21 committee of that chamber passed.

22 MR. POTEET:

23 So they never really withdrew
24 it, but it's more or less dead?

25 MS. MORRIS:

1 The Chairman said he's not
2 scheduling any more bills.

3 MR. POTEET:

4 It's dying a slow death.

5 MR. PARNELL:

6 House Bill 1074,
7 Representative Billiot -- Commissioner
8 Duplessis just came in and I want to kind
9 let him speak on that and kind of talk about
10 the other bills already.

11 So if you will.

12 MR. POTEET:

13 Jump right in, Ron.

14 MR. DUPLESSIS:

15 Yes. 1074 is a very
16 interesting bill. It's basically asking for
17 a change in the law to open up the markets
18 for the rent-to-own insurance -- contingent
19 liability insurance. It was found by the
20 committee after some interesting testimony
21 by Randy Hainey, which I didn't think was
22 quite accurate, that the markets, as they
23 were, were adequate to serve the rent-to-own
24 dealerships. And that really wasn't the
25 findings of what I thought the study

1 committee was. I was alarmed that the
2 committee didn't pay a lot of attention to
3 the study resolution. And, normally, they
4 do it after you put that much effort in, and
5 I think we approached it right. But as a
6 Commission member, and Derek is held to the
7 same standard along with Sheri and all of us
8 on the committee, that we have to have a
9 neutral position and we can't fake a
10 position. We have to report the accurate
11 facts and I believe we did as well as we
12 could.

13 They had a very good lobby
14 group and they did a good job and they
15 defeated the bill in committee. So that
16 leaves us with still the issue of whether
17 it's adequate markets or not and to be
18 settled by this Commission as the reading of
19 the most recent letter from the Insurance
20 Department, which you may want to share with
21 this Commission.

22 And, basically, we had sent a
23 letter asking what the position was with the
24 Insurance Commission on this position. They
25 said, time out, this is your issue, it goes

1 back to you, your Commission makes the
2 decision as to whether these are adequate
3 markets. This is not an Insurance
4 Commission issue. So the whole matter, I
5 guess, just eventually is back in our hands
6 again to make a decision as to whether we
7 feel like it's adequate markets. Just
8 because there was legislation attempted,
9 legislation that didn't succeed, it has
10 nothing to do with the issue before the
11 Commission at this point. That's the way I
12 see it.

13 Sheri, you might want to
14 clean that up and shape it a little better.

15 MS. MORRIS:

16 Mr. Kiraly testified on
17 behalf of the dealers, and Kevin was there
18 as well, which gave information from the
19 industry. There was some mention during the
20 committee that this was a brother-in-law
21 deal or whatever and I spoke with one of the
22 committee members after the meeting and he
23 said something about somebody had left
24 SEADRA and they were trying to compete and
25 they weren't going to enable them to do

1 that, and that really wasn't anything that
2 -- that wasn't any consideration in the
3 report that we did. So it became some sort
4 of a dispute between some former employee of
5 SEADRA and SEADRA, whatever, and that's what
6 they were being told, I guess, outside of
7 the committee, the public hearing. So they
8 didn't want to be a part of that. But I
9 don't think they really maybe took enough
10 time to review the study resolution.

11 MR. DUPLESSIS:

12 It was an 11 to five vote to
13 defer the issue. And I think five people
14 really understood the issue. Five people on
15 the other side thought they did and there
16 were six people in the middle that were
17 caught up in the wash. Often very
18 complicated issues cannot be accurately
19 depicted without a lot of study. And you've
20 got to remember, these committee members are
21 Legislators and they're trying to understand
22 your issue from your hometown school system,
23 your issue for your hometown towing
24 association or whatever it is. They have a
25 lot of issues and they have very little

1 amount of time to get it. So they become
2 impressionable on certain things and I just
3 don't think that they got the accurate story
4 and I don't think that they liked the
5 conflict of the cause and, therefore, they
6 deferred it. But that really has nothing to
7 do with what's still incumbent upon this
8 Commission to decide the issue.

9 Would you address that? You
10 might want to --

11 MS. MORRIS:

12 I think we're going to have
13 -- we're going to have a hearing later,
14 which involves a dealer and contingent
15 liability insurance.

16 MR. DUPLESSIS:

17 Otherwise, I think we got our
18 other bill our passed. I don't think we had
19 a dissenting vote through any of the
20 committees or House or the Senate. So I
21 believe you guys -- the governor has signed
22 it or is going to sign it?

23 MR. HALLACK:

24 Yes.

25 MR. DUPLESSIS:

1 So we got our legislation
2 passed.

3 MR. HALLACK:

4 Act 136.

5 MR. DUPLESSIS:

6 That concludes my portion.

7 MR. POTEET:

8 Thanks, Ron.

9 Anything else on legislative
10 to discuss or address at this point?

11 (No response.)

12 MR. POTEET:

13 All right. We'll move on to
14 the Executive Director's report.

15 MR. PARNELL:

16 If you'll turn with me to
17 your totals -- your complaint totals. The
18 first item would be the alleged issue counts
19 for the month of April 2012. There were 37
20 alleged issues for the month. The highest
21 was non-delivery of title, as it is month to
22 month. The second document is our case
23 report, which shows 33 assigned cases for
24 the month of April. Three of those cases
25 were completed for that month. And the last

1 document that you have is a case summary --
2 or cases closed -- cases that were closed
3 during the month of April, which are 32,
4 which is not specific to cases that were
5 open in that month, and some of these are
6 cases from the prior months. That would
7 conclude my report on the complaint totals.

8 MR. POTEET:

9 Does anybody have any
10 questions for Derek on those or comments?

11 (No response.)

12 MR. POTEET:

13 All right. Does anybody
14 object to taking a short break before we get
15 into the hearings, maybe five minutes or so?

16 (No response.)

17 (Recess taken.)

18 MR. POTEET:

19 Mr. Hallack.

20 MR. HALLACK:

21 Mr. Chairman, before we
22 adjourn the regular meeting, there's
23 something I need to call your attention to.
24 If you go back into your notebook, there
25 were some orders of dismissal that we failed

1 to discuss. We will need a motion to
2 authorize you and Mr. Parnell to execute
3 those other dismissals. One dismissal was
4 with regard to the complaints filed by Trey
5 Hill of C&H Motors. If you remember, we
6 discussed that and Mr. Hill actually paid
7 money to get his -- additional money to get
8 his titles. So we'll need a motion to
9 authorize Derek Parnell and yourself, John
10 Poteet, to sign those dismissals with regard
11 to --

12 MR. POTEET:

13 There are two of them in
14 here.

15 MR. HALLACK:

16 There are two. One is Trey
17 Hill of C&H Motors and the other one is
18 Rochon RV. And Rochon RV, as you might
19 recall, they are going to go to court to
20 resolve their differences. Rochon RV is
21 document 2011-427. So we'll need a motion
22 to authorize you and Mr. Parnell to sign
23 that dismissal upon receipt of the funds.

24 MR. TAYLOR:

25 I make a motion that Derek

1 and John Poteet have the authority to sign
2 the dismissals after receiving the funds.

3 MR. SMITH:

4 Second.

5 MR. POTEET:

6 All in favor, say "Aye."

7 (All "Aye" responses.)

8 MR. POTEET:

9 All right. We need one on
10 Trey Hill, right.

11 MR. HALLACK:

12 Yes. That's Docket No. 428,
13 order of dismissal for Trey Hill of C&H
14 Motors. He had filed a complaint with the
15 agency as well requesting his titles. They
16 worked those out and resolved it completely.
17 So we'll need a motion to authorize you and
18 Mr. Parnell to execute this order of
19 dismissal upon receipt of funds.

20 MR. POTEET:

21 A motion?

22 MR. SMITH:

23 I make the motion.

24 MR. POTEET:

25 Darty made the motion.

1 Second?

2 MR. TAYLOR:

3 Second.

4 MR. POTEET:

5 All in favor, say "Aye."

6 (All "Aye" responses.)

7 MR. POTEET:

8 Okay. Thank you.

9 MR. HALLACK:

10 That concludes the regular
11 business of the Commission and I ask that
12 the regular meeting be adjourned.

13 MR. POTEET:

14 We have a motion to adjourn.

15 MR. TAYLOR:

16 Second.

17 MR. POTEET:

18 All in favor, say "Aye."

19 (All "Aye" responses.)

20 MR. POTEET:

21 All right.
