IV. Collateral Consequences

Carle Jackson

Louisiana has a large number of collateral consequences of conviction. While such consequences are not typically considered as part of a criminal sentence, they are a direct consequence of conviction and are often more onerous than the criminal sanction imposed. Most of these consequences apply to all felonies, or to broad classifications of felonies, and remain in effect for the lifetime of the defendant. Many of these severely limit the ability of a former offender to obtain a job, thus directly impacting his ability to successfully reenter the work force. As there is no appeal from or review of the collateral consequences, therefore, these provisions, while perhaps useful, create issues for successful reentry. Perhaps the Commission through the Reentry Committee could consider the collateral consequences of conviction from several perspectives:

- Does the prohibition have a logical nexus to the offenses
- Does the prohibition appear to serve a substantial public interest
- Should such prohibitions apply for life or be subject to review and possible modification or relief from a competent authority such as the Court or Parole Committee
- Is there any empirical data supporting the prohibition

The Reentry Committee accepted the task of examining the Collateral Consequences of Conviction. .

V. Planning 2015 Term: Issues for consideration

- A. New Issues for Release Mechanisms and Re-Entry- Explore evidence based programs for the transition from prison to free world, such as the use of Job coaches to improve employment performance.
